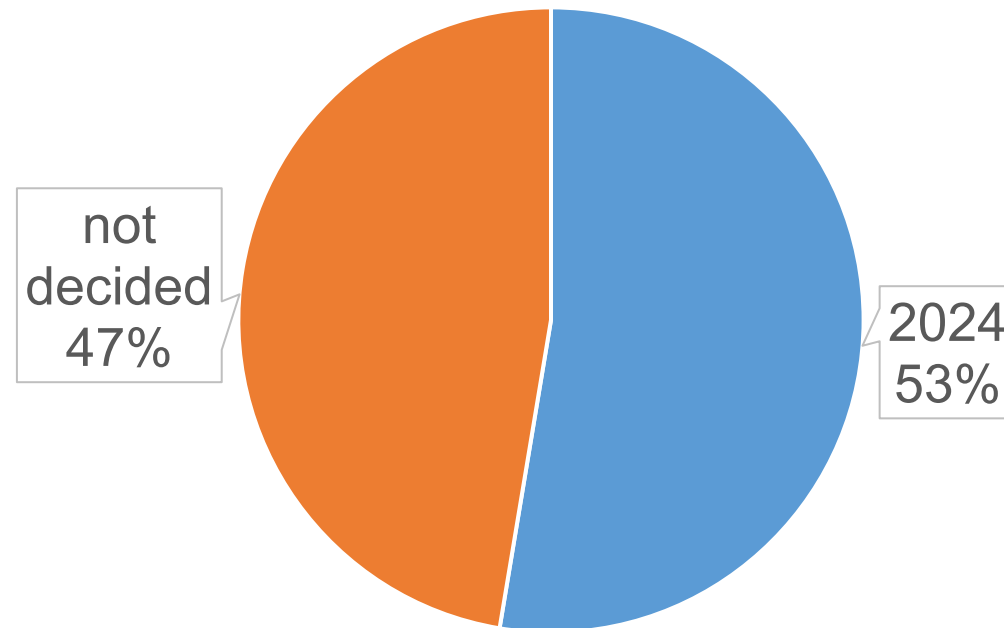

Background

- **Aim of the survey:** The survey assessed the readiness of JCM partner countries for Article 6 reporting, focusing on the initial report. Its aim was to identify the common needs and challenges of partner countries to provide effective support in advance of the initial report submission.
- **Response Overview:** The survey was distributed to all JCM partner countries and received input from 19 respondents across 16 countries.

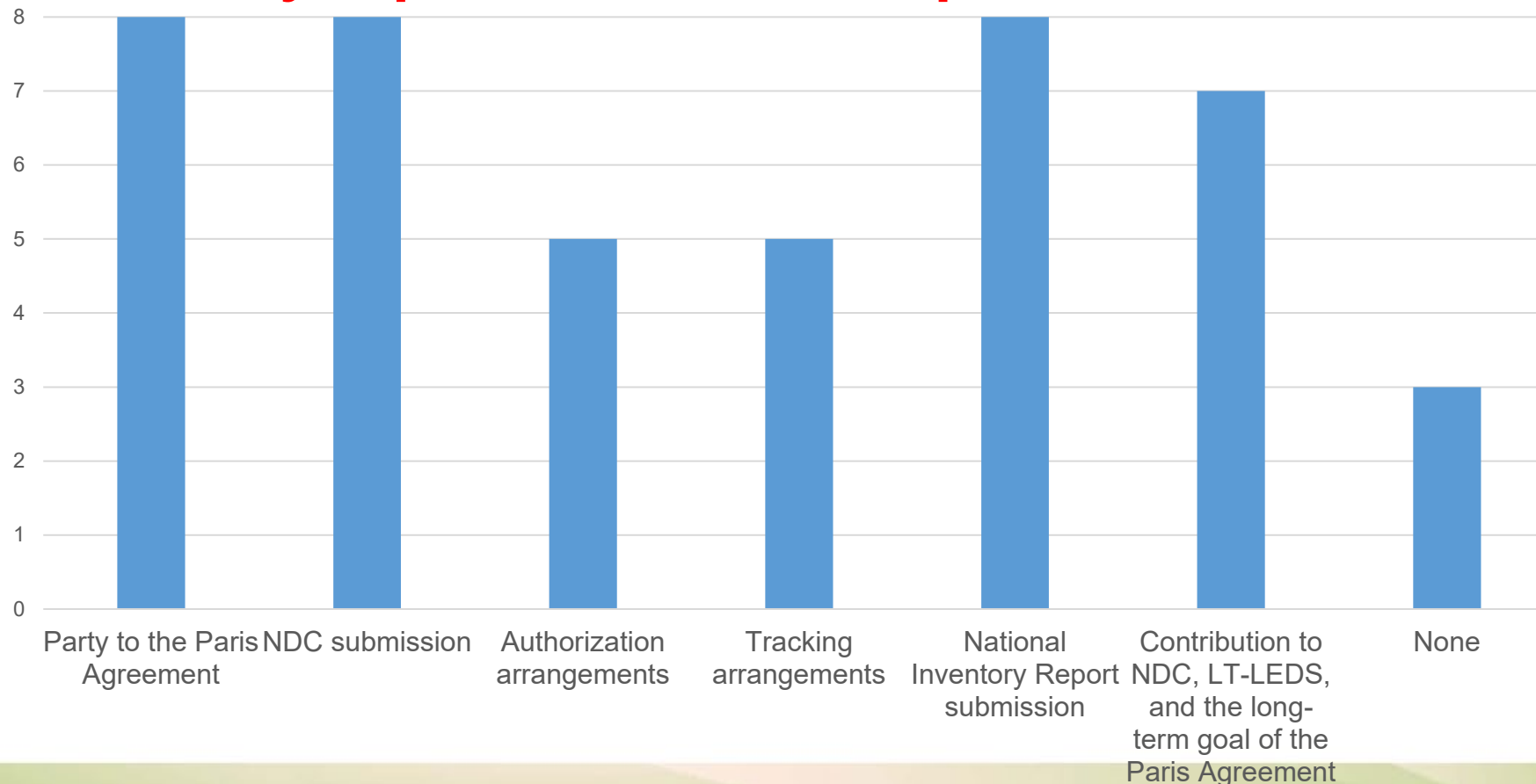
Q1. When will your country submit the initial report of Article 6 to the UNFCCC?

About 50% of the respondents are preparing to submit their initial Article 6 reports by 2024, highlighting proactive engagements from JCM partner countries.

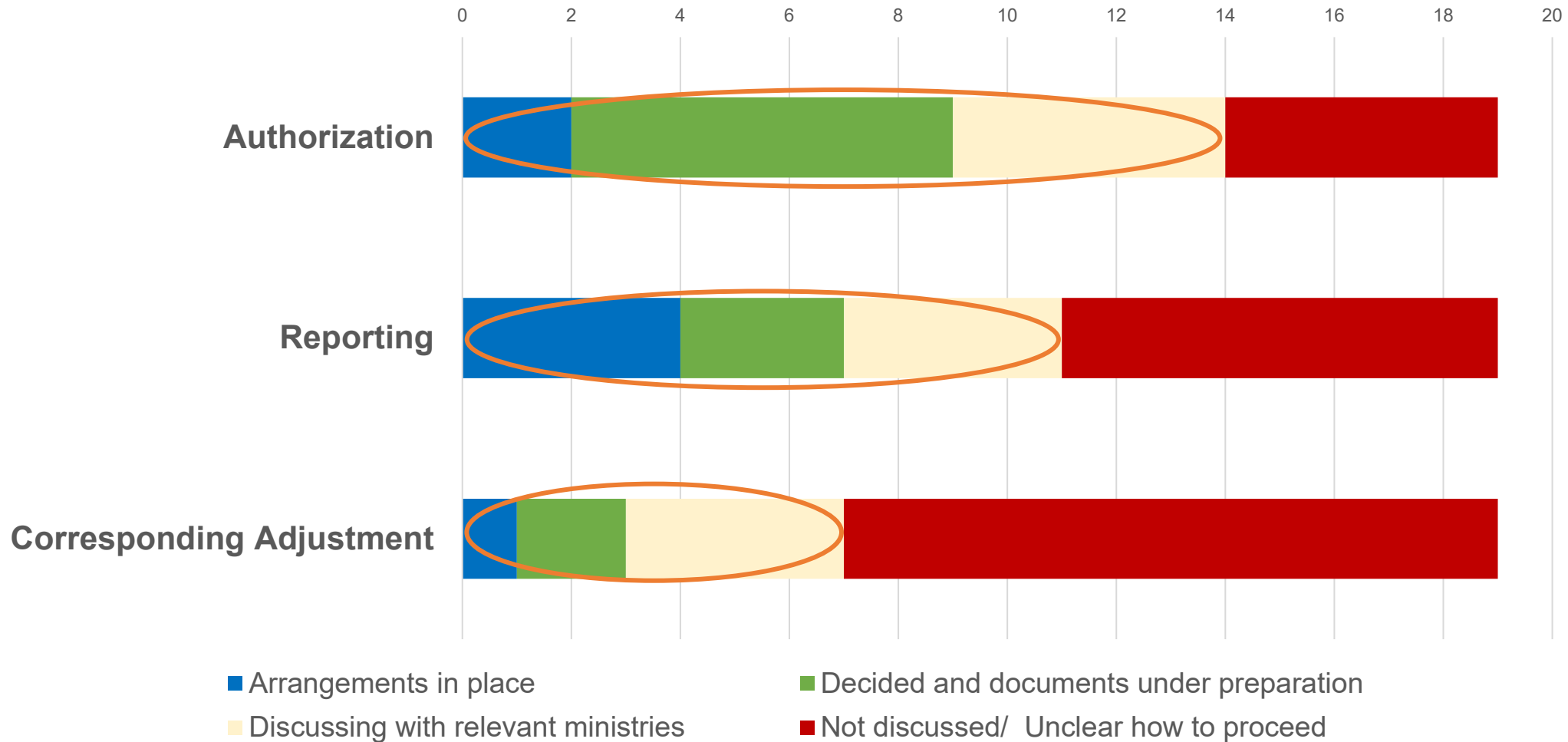


Q2. Does your country have any challenges in meeting the following requirements related to participation responsibilities on Article 6?

As most countries seem to have already fulfilled requirements as a Party to the Paris Agreement and NDC submissions, **prominent challenges now lying in other parts (e.g. National Inventory Report submissions, explanation on contribution to NDC)**

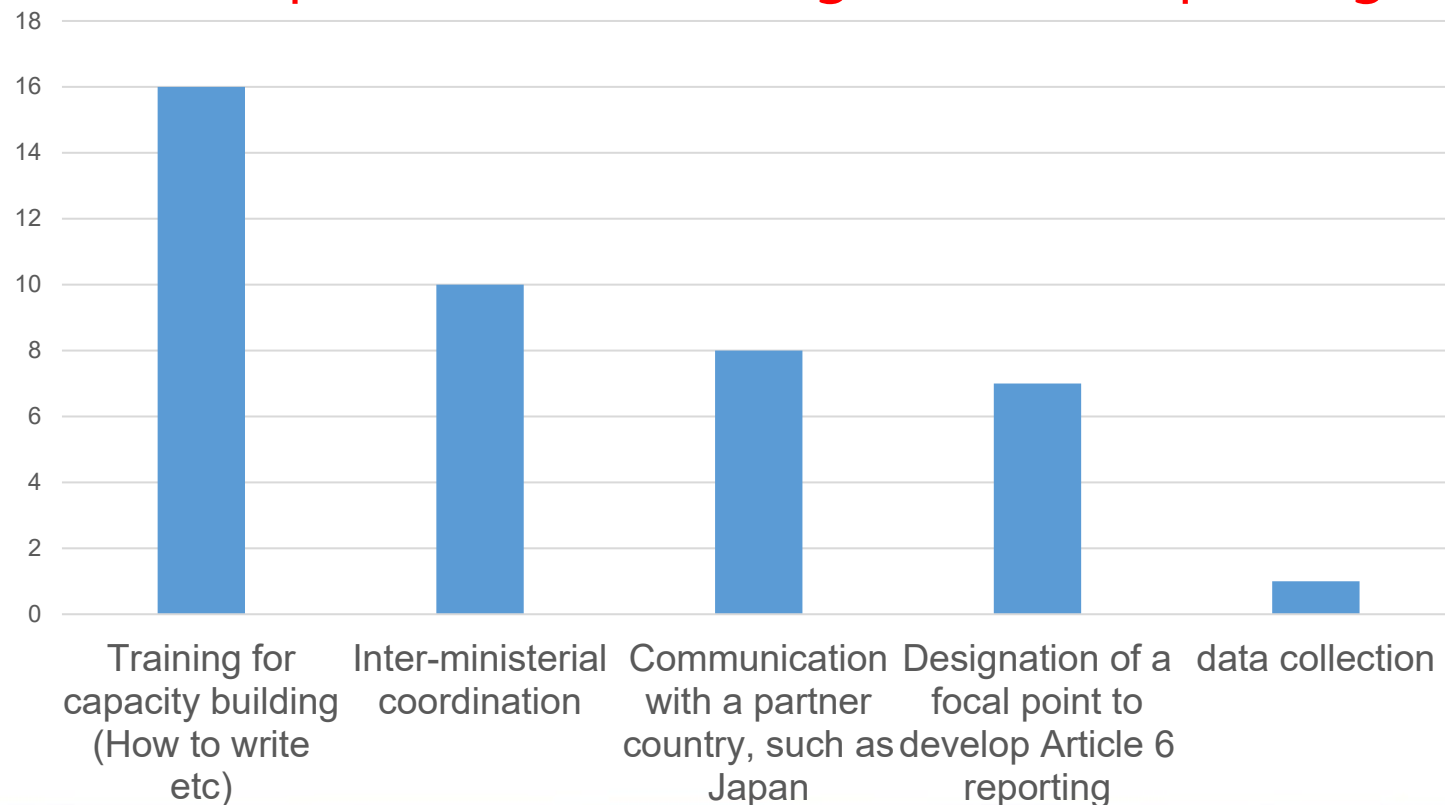


Q3, Q4, Q5 Domestic Arrangement Readiness



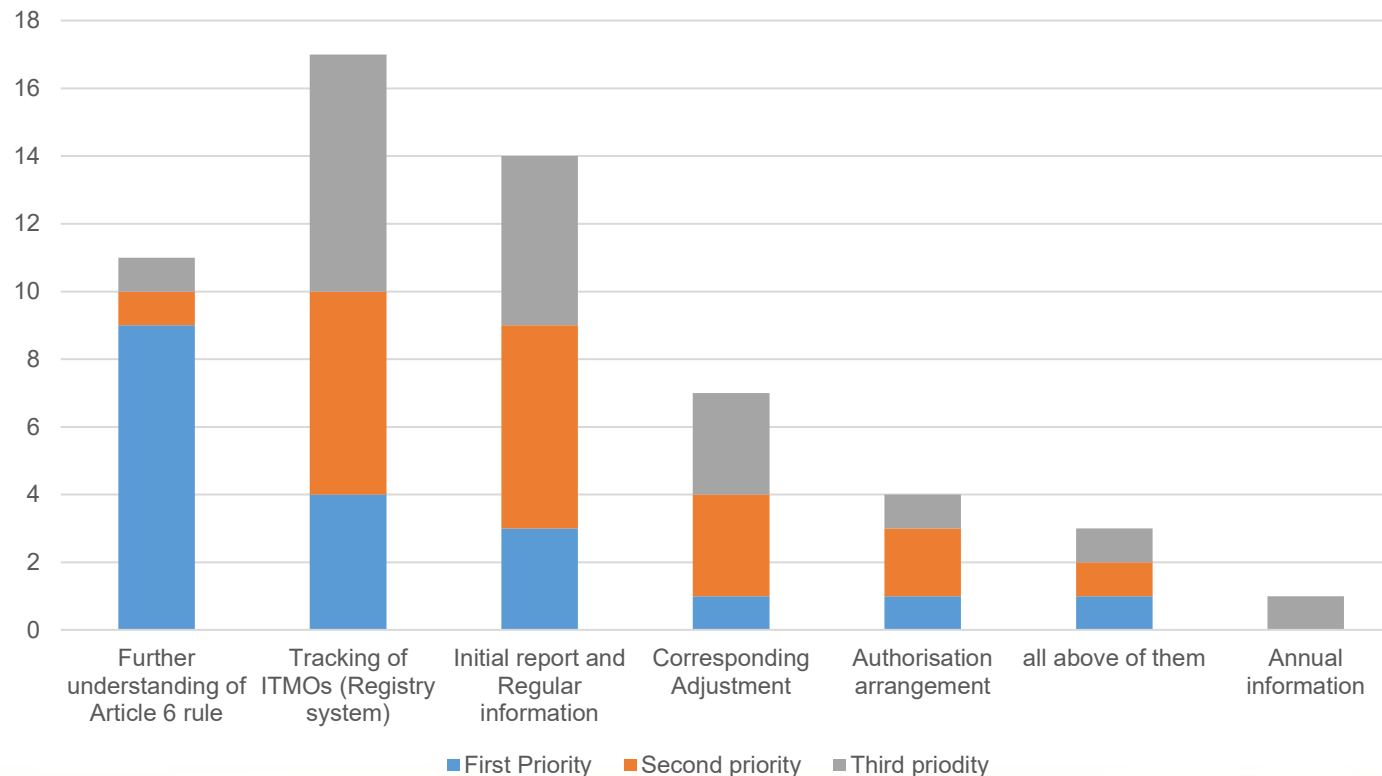
Q6. What kind of arrangements do you need for Article 6 reporting?

The predominant need identified is capacity building, with 38% seeking training, underscoring the crucial role of knowledge transfer and skills development in facilitating Article 6 reporting.



Q7. What kind of areas would you like to prioritize for capacity building?

While there is an urgent need across the board for a deeper understanding of **Article 6 rules**, the focus should shift towards more specific areas



Key takeaways

For the submission of (updated) initial report in 2024

- **A majority of the participants, representing 53%, are actively preparing for the 2024 report submissions** - however, a significant portion remains indecisive, underscoring an urgent need for targeted guidance and support to facilitate their readiness.
- **The critical areas requiring capacity-building support have been identified as internal country-specific decisions, including the method for corresponding adjustment and the development of institutional frameworks for tracking, reporting, and authorization** - tailored capacity-building supports in these domains are crucial to enable successful initial report submissions
- **The disparity in readiness levels across countries suggests that sharing best practices and experiences could be key** - leveraging the advanced state of preparedness of some countries through knowledge exchange and collaborative learning could be utilized for more effective Article 6 preparation among Joint Crediting Mechanism (JCM) partner countries
