The climate crisis is a child's rights crisis

1 billion

Children live at extremely high risk to impacts of climate change

88%

of the additional disease burden from climate change will be borne by children under 5

2.4%

of climate finance from key multilateral climate funds support projects incorporating child-responsive activities

Challenges

1. **Essential services are not adapted** to the impacts of the climate crisis
2. Policies and strategies to address climate change **do not incorporate children's rights**
3. Children and young people do not have **opportunities to participate and influence** climate action
4. **Mitigation measures** are not sufficient



UNICEF work

1. **Essential services adapted** to strengthen community resilience, specially where most needed (indigenous communities, urban centres' peripheries, etc.)
2. Children's rights, unique needs and vulnerabilities are **integrated into climate policy**
3. **Empower children and young people** to be climate defenders
4. Advocate for **ambitious climate mitigation**
