Context

Plastic pollution is a major global environmental challenge, with the tourism sector playing a significant role in both plastic consumption and the generation of plastic waste. Sri Lanka, as a key tourism destination, has taken steps to address this issue through regulatory measures, industry-led initiatives, and pilot projects.

The webinar builds on a pilot project targeting the tourism sector, implemented in the context of a larger project implemented by the MoE in close collaboration with the BRS Secretariat, IGES and Help-O, and financed by the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation (Norad). As part of this pilot project, three hotels in Galle City developed and started implementing action plans to reduce the generation of plastic waste as well as to improve the environmentally sound management of plastic waste. Trainings/workshops were undertaken and microfiber filter installed to capture microplastics in laundry. Moreover, a 'Guide to Manage Plastic Waste at Small and Medium Hotels in Sri Lanka' was developed, placing particular emphasis on the use of locally available alternatives, compiled in cooperation with the National Crafts Council.

The Global Tourism Plastics Initiative is a global action and commitment framework, led by UNEP in collaboration with UN Tourism and the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, that supports tourism businesses in reducing plastic pollution and transitioning towards a circular economy for plastics. During the webinar the GTPI will present solutions and case studies for elimination of single use plastics from operations of tourism businesses and introduction of reusable solutions.

Objective

The webinar aims to:

- Build on previous efforts by diving deeper into practical solutions for plastic reduction and ESM of plastic waste in Sri Lanka's tourism sector.
- Equip tourism businesses with knowledge and tools to eliminate problematic single-use plastics (SUPs) and replace them with viable, reusable alternatives, including locally sourced.











- Provide concrete guidance on self-assessment tools, locally available alternatives, and how businesses can engage with GTPI to scale up action.
- Provide opportunities for exchanging experiences, lessons learned and solutions.
