# The municipal reform in Norway

- 🌐 2014: Parliament agrees on municipal structural reform
- 🌐 2016: Asker, Hurum and Røyken decide to merge
- 🌐 2020: New Asker will be the 8<sup>th</sup> largest municipality in Norway
- 🌐 From 60 000 to 93 000 inhabitants
- 🌐 9000 employees filling 6500 full time positions
- 🌐 From 101 square kilometers to 376





- Initiative of the three mayors
- The joint executive council of the merger:  
“The SDGs shall be the framework for our municipal Master Plan”

# Guidelines for the municipal master plan

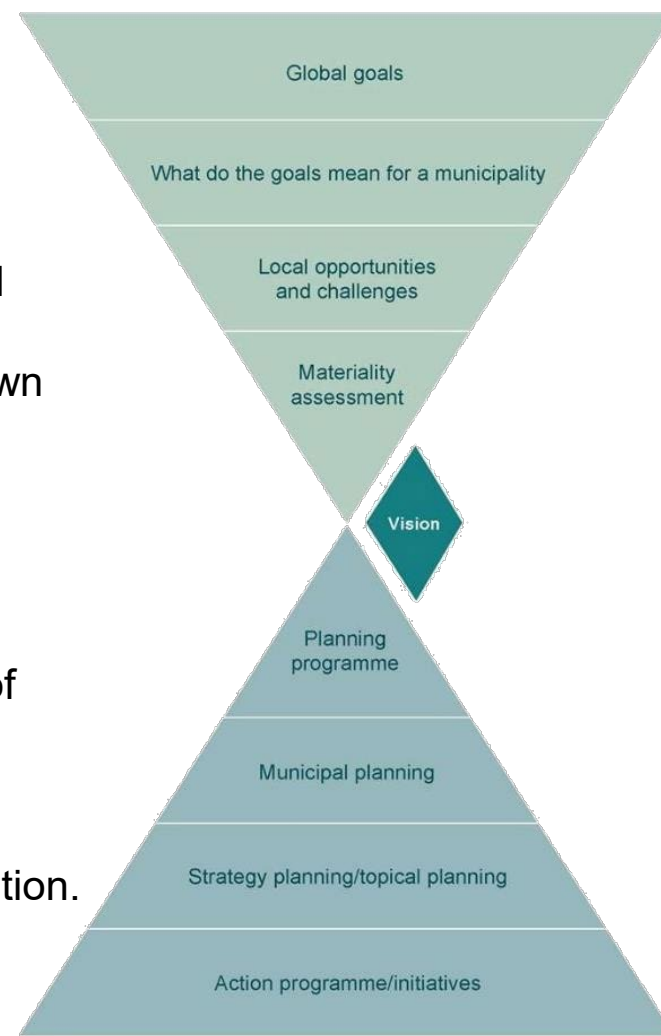




The upper triangle shows a broad-based starting point which is then narrowed down from the global to the local perspective.



The lower triangle shows the hierarchy of our local plans, where initiatives are incorporated for subsequent implementation.











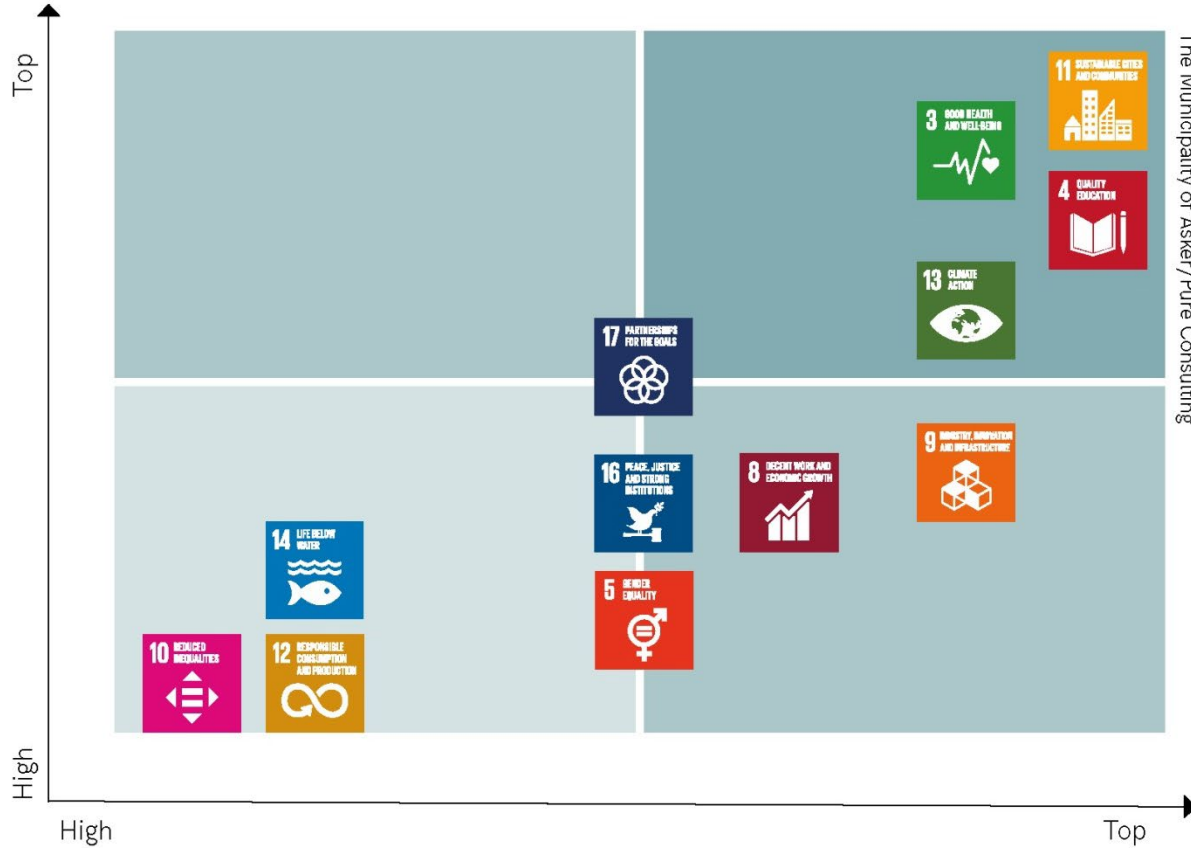
