

Stockholm+50: A Healthy Planet for the Prosperity of All – Our Responsibility, Our Opportunity

An international meeting hosted by Sweden and Kenya Stockholm, Sweden 2-3 June 2022



Securing a healthy and prosperous planet for all means embarking on a joint journey where our footprint of today does not hamper the well-being of current and future generations. Stockholm+50 presents an opportunity for co-creation and multistakeholder approach to accelerate implementation in the coming decade in areas fundamental to a sustainable future: the relationship between human and nature, what we invest in, and how resources are used and shared.

What is the mandate of Stockholm+50? – the UN mandate

Enabling resolution (A/RES/75/280 of 24 May 2021) laying the foundation for the international meeting by deciding on title, dates and location, stating that the purpose of Stockholm+50 is to contribute to the environmental dimension of sustainable development to accelerate the implementation of commitments in the context of the decade of action and delivery for sustainable development, including a sustainable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Modalities resolution (A/RES/75/326 of 10 September 2021) providing the structure, format, preparations and organisational arrangements; specifying the themes of the three leadership dialogues; deciding that two Presidents (from Sweden and from Kenya) will be elected; and appointing UNEP Executive Director as the Secretary-General of the meeting.

Recalling the Stockholm Declaration of the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment, held in Stockholm from 5 to 16 June 1972, 1

Recalling also the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development,² Agenda 21,³ the Programme for the Further Implementation of Agenda 21,⁴ the Johannesburg Declaration on Sustainable Development⁵ and the Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development (Johannesburg Plan of Implementation)⁶ and the outcome document of the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development, entitled "The future we want",⁷ as well as the outcomes of all the major United Nations conferences and summits in the economic, social and environmental fields,

Reaffirming all the principles of the Rio Declaration,

Reaffirming also its resolution 70/1 of 25 September 2015, entitled "Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development", in which it adopted a comprehensive, far-reaching and people-centred set of universal and



Presidents' Final Remarks to Plenary

Key recommendations for accelerating action towards a healthy planet for the prosperity of all

- 1. Place human well-being at the centre of a healthy planet and prosperity for all, through recognizing that a healthy planet is a prerequisite for peace, cohesion and prosperous societies;
- Recognize and implement the right to a clean, healthy and sustainable environment, through fulfilling the vision articulated in principle 1 of the 1972 Stockholm Declaration;

- Adopt system wide change in the way our current economic system works to contribute to a healthy planet;
- 4. Strengthen national implementation of existing commitments for a healthy planet;
- Align public and private financial flows with environmental climate and sustainable development commitments;
- Accelerate system-wide transformations of high impact sectors, such as food, energy, water, buildings, and construction, manufacturing and mobility;
- 7. Rebuild relationships of trust for strengthened cooperation and solidarity;
- 8. Reinforce and reinvigorate the multilateral system;
- 9. Recognize intergenerational responsibility as a cornerstone of sound policy-making; and
- 10. Take forward the Stockholm+50 outcomes.

Environmental Moments: A UNEP@50 timeline

The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) is celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2022. Founded in 1972 following the landmark UN Conference on the Human Environment, UNEP was conceived to monitor the state of the environment, inform policy making with science and coordinate responses to the world's environmental challenges.

Since its creation, UNEP has worked closely with its 193 Member States and other stakeholders to galvanize worldwide commitments and coordinated action to address many of the world's most pressing environmental challenges. It also played a leading role as the docking station for 15 multilateral environmental agreements.

Here's a look back at UNEP's history and how it has helped shape five decades of environmental milestones.

UNEP opens first headquarters

On 2 October, Kenya's first President Jomo Kenyatta inaugurates UNEP's headquarters at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre. In 1975, UNEP moves to a new location on the site of an old coffee farm on the outskirts of Nairobi, where it remains to this day. The first meeting of the Governing Council of UNEP takes place in the Palais des Nations, Geneva, in June 1973.




A general view of the opening meeting of the UN Conference at the Folkets Hus in Stockholm

On 5 June 1972, the UN Conference on the Human Environment opened its first plenary session at the Folkets Hus in Stockholm. As host, Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme restated that his government attached the greatest importance to the success of the conference. His speech also openly criticized the industrialized world for its ecological and economic exploitation, causing the world's greatest environmental problems at the expense of developing countries. While his critique was emblematic for the general tensions between developed and


